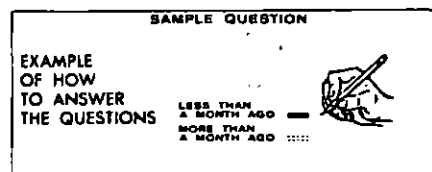

CENSUS REGULATIONS

S.R. & O. No. 16: 1970

THE CENSUS ACT, 1950
REGULATIONS

The Minister of Revenue Council responsible for Registration Matters and Insulated Matters under the authority of section 8 of the above Act.

THE CENSUS REGULATIONS, 1970.

Interpretation.

1. (1) In these Regulations —
 - "the Census" means the census directed, by the census officer, to be taken in the Islands on the 10th day of February, 1970, to be taken in these Islands on the 28th day of October, 1970;
 - "census night" means the night of the 9th to the 10th day of October, 1970;
 - "census officer" has the meaning assigned to it in section 6 of the Census Act, 1950;
 - "dwelling" means any building or part of a building used for human habitation including a tent or other temporary structure; and the expression "private dwelling" means a separate dwelling, not being a hotel or an institution;
 - "hotel" means any hotel, boarding house, guest house or lodging house;
 - "institution" means a hospital, nursing home, home for aged persons or children, poor house, hostel, boarding school, prison or other place of detention, or similar institution;
 - "usual visitor" means a person who is resident in these Islands but is not spending census night in his own household or dwelling;
 - "member of the armed forces" means a member of any of the naval, military, or air forces of Her Majesty or of the United States of America, or a civilian employed with any such force being a member of any such force or any such division who is in these Islands of the territorial waters thereof by reason only of his duties as such;
 - "overseas visitor" means a person, other than a member of the armed forces or the wife or a member of the family of a member of the armed forces, who, being ordinarily resident outside these Islands, is on a temporary visit (not exceeding six months) to these Islands and whose gained occupation (if any) is carried on outside these Islands;
 - "prescribed particulars" means any particulars as to which information is required to be obtained by these Regulations;
 - "resident" means a person who is resident in these Islands, not being a person who is an overseas visitor, a transient, or a member of the armed forces or the wife or a member of the family of a member of the armed forces;
 - "Superintendent of Census" means the person appointed to be the Superintendents of Census, under the Census Act, 1950;
 - "transient" means a person, other than a member of the armed forces or the wife or a member of the family of a member of the armed forces, who, being ordinarily resident outside these Islands, is within these Islands or the territorial waters thereof by reason of being en route via these Islands to a place outside these Islands; and
 - "vessel" includes any ship or boat of whatsoever description.
- (2) Where in these Regulations there is any reference to the meaning of census night by any person to any place, the reference shall be construed as including a reference to the meaning of census night by that person in that place.
- Particulars in respect of persons.
 2. (1) Such particulars as are referred to in this Regulation shall be obtained in respect of every person who passes census night —
 - (a) as any place on land within these Islands, other than one of the United States Seas; or
 - (b) on any vessel within the territorial waters of these Islands, other than a vessel of Her Majesty or of the United States of America.

(1) In respect of residences the following particulars shall be obtained, that is to say —

- (i) Surname and Given names
- (ii) Relationship to head of household
- (iii) Sex
- (iv) Age in completed years
- (v) Date of birth
- (vi) Usual residence
- (vii) Birth place
- (viii) Race
- (ix) Religion
- (x) Years lived in Parish of residence
- (xi) Number of Parishes lived in
- (xii) Parish last lived in
- (xiii) Possession or non-possession of Bermudian Status
- (xiv) Length of stay in Bermuda (for residents born outside Bermuda)
- (xv) Type of school being attended, full and part-time
- (xvi) Highest level of education attained
- (xvii) Vocation for which trained or being trained, the method by which such training was or is being acquired and the period of training if training is and ever completed
- (xviii) Main activity during past week (e.g. worked, with job, not working, seeking first job, home duties, student, retired)
- (xix) Hours worked in past week at main and subsidiary occupations
- (xx) Main and subsidiary type of job or occupation
- (xxi) For all persons previous main and subsidiary occupations in which engaged
- (xxii) Work or occupational status during past week (e.g. worked for others, had own business or farm)
- (xxiii) Number of weeks worked during past 12 months
- (xxiv) Number of liveborn children ever born
- (xxv) Sex of mother at birth of first live-born child
- (xxvi) Age of mother at birth of last live-born child
- (xxvii) Number of livebirths stillbirths during past twelve months
- (xxviii) Marital status (married or common law) at present or at age 15
- (xxix) Duration of union referred to in (xxviii)
- (xxx) Where person spent census night
- (xxxi) For all persons

(2) In respect of overseas visitors and transients the following particulars shall be obtained, that is to say —

- (a) Surname and Given name
- (b) Sex
- (c) Age
- (d) Country of ordinary residence
- (e) Proposed total length of stay in Bermuda.

Particulars in respect of dwellings.

3. In respect of private dwellings the following particulars shall be obtained, that is to say —

- (i) Type of building in which dwelling is situated
- (ii) Type tenure
- (iii) Year when first occupied
- (iv) Year when dwelling built
- (v) Material of outer walls
- (vi) Number of rooms
- (vii) Household equipment
- (viii) Period of rental payment and amount of rent paid.

4. Any form to be used for the purpose of obtaining the information set out in regulations 2 and 3 of these Regulations shall be in accordance with the provisions of such Regulations.

CENSUS REGULATIONS

Persons required to give particulars.
 6. (1) It shall be the duty of the persons hereinafter in this regulation mentioned to give the prescribed particulars other than particulars in respect of the armed forces, their wives and families.
 (2) In respect of persons who pass census night in a private dwelling it shall be the duty of the head of the household and of every person who has charge of the dwelling to cause certain night to take place in the dwelling to give the prescribed particulars.

(3) In respect of persons who pass census night in a hotel it shall be the duty of the manager or person in charge of the hotel to give the prescribed particulars.

(4) In respect of persons who pass census night in an institution it shall be the duty of the person in charge of the institution to give the prescribed particulars.

(5) In respect of persons who pass census night on a vessel within the territorial waters of these Islands it shall be the duty of the master or person in charge of the vessel to give the prescribed particulars.

(6) In respect of a private dwelling it shall be the duty of the head of the household or person in charge of the dwelling to give the prescribed particulars.

Method of obtaining particulars. Power of entry etc.

6. (1) In the regulation —
 (a) "the appropriate person" means, in relation to the giving of any prescribed particulars, the person whose duty it is under the last foregoing regulation, to give those prescribed particulars; and
 (b) "premises" means any building or part of a building or any land in these Islands, or any vessel within the territorial waters of these Islands.

(2) Subject as hereinafter provided, the prescribed particulars shall be given by the appropriate person to a census officer whenever, on the 25th day of October, 1970, the census officer so requires: and the appropriate person shall be bound to comply with such requirement of the appropriate person or by or under the direction of the census officer.

Provided that, on any day during the period of four weeks immediately preceding the said 25th day of October, 1970, a census officer may require any person who for the time being is an inmate of or is in charge of any premises, being premises which a census officer has power under this regulation to enter, to give to him any information in any way relating to or ancillary to or preparatory to the obtaining of the prescribed particulars —

- (a) in respect of persons who are likely to pass census night on those premises; or
- (b) in respect of those premises.

(3) A census officer, while acting in the discharge of his duties as such, may at all reasonable hours enter any premises in those circumstances and for those purposes as if he were a constable of Her Majesty or of the United States of America.

Particulars in respect of persons to a United States Boat.

7. (1) In respect of persons who pass census night —
 (a) within one of the United States Boats; or
 (b) on a vessel of Her Majesty or of the United States of America within the territorial waters of these Islands the Superintendent of Census shall obtain such particulars as he may consider expedient for the purposes of the Census and as it may be practicable for him to obtain.

(2) For carrying into effect the provisions of this regulation the Superintendent of Census shall make such arrangements as are necessary with the appropriate commanding officers or persons authorized in that behalf by the appropriate commanding officer.

Obligations of census employees.

8. (1) It shall be the duty of every census employee to comply with and observe the regulations made by the Superintendent of Census with instructions relating to the taking or to the completion of the Census.

(2) Every census employee shall at such time as the Superintendent of Census may direct make a declaration before a Justice of the Peace in the following form, that is to say —

"I,, solemnly and sincerely declare that I will faithfully and honestly fulfil my duties as a

census employee in conformity with the Census Act, 1960 and any regulations made thereunder, and in conformity with any regulations issued in pursuance of the said Act or such regulations, and that I will not, without due authority disclose or make known any matter or thing which comes to my knowledge by reason of my employment as such.

CENSUS GUIDELINES FOR DETERMINING BERMUDIAN STATUS

To: Commissioners and Supervisors

Memorandum from the Attorney General

Bermudian Status

The entitlement to and acquisition of Bermudian Status is regulated by the provisions of Part III of the Bermuda Immigration and Protection Act, 1956, which came into force on the 1st July, 1956.

For the sake of convenience one can first divide persons having Bermudian Status into 2 classes -

1. Persons born on or after 1st July, 1956 and persons born before that date who acquired Bermudian Status after that date; and
 2. Persons born before 1st July, 1956, who were deemed to possess Bermudian status after that date because of various qualifications possessed by them before that date.
1. (a) Persons born on or after 1st July, 1956

A person born after 1st July, 1956, has Bermudian Status -

- (a) if one of his parents have Bermudian Status and
- (b) if both his parents are domiciled in Bermuda and
- (c) if at birth he is a British subject.

NOTE the above rules apply to legitimated and legitimate persons. In the case of an illegitimate child who has never been legitimated the status and domicile of the putative father are ignored and only the mother's status and domicile are relevant.

- (b) Persons born before 1st July, 1956, who acquired status after that date

A person can acquire Bermudian Status by grant from the Member for Immigration if -

- (a) he is a British subject
- (b) he has been normally resident in Bermuda for 5 years preceding his application and
- (c) he is 21 years or over.

NOTE until 1967 the period used to be 7 years.

The wife of a person having Bermudian Status is also "deemed" to have Bermudian Status until she is either divorced or judicially separated from her husband.

The child of a person who acquires Bermudian Status is deemed to have Bermudian Status until he is 21, and may apply on his own behalf when he is 18.

2. Persons born before 1st July, 1956 who are deemed to possess Bermudian Status by reason of various qualifications possessed by them prior to 1st July, 1956.

A person who was prior to 1st July, 1956, deemed to be domiciled in Bermuda under the Immigration Act, 1937, (as amended on various occasions) possesses Bermudian Status.

The persons deemed to be domiciled here under the Act were persons who being British subjects -

- (a) were born here or, if born abroad, were born of parents who at the time of their birth were ordinarily resident here, or
- (b) had been ordinarily resident here for 7 years
- (c) were naturalised by the Governor, or
- (d) the issues of such persons.

BUT, civil servants, consuls etc., nurses, school teachers, clergymen and Cable and Wireless employees and their dependants could not acquire domicile under that Act.

The above is a general outline of the position which is, in fact, considerably more complicated.
